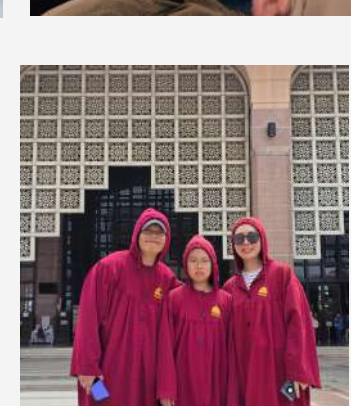
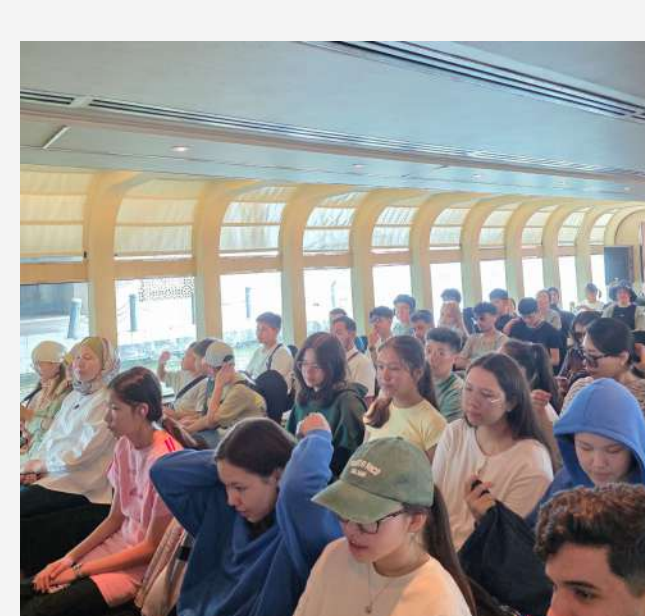
I will continue my internship in Malaysia.

Announcement on Malaysia's revised 6% SST

Under the revised Malaysia Sales and Service Tax (SST) rules came into effect on July 1 2025, a 6% service tax will apply to private education services provided to non-Malaysian students. This includes preschools, schools, colleges, universities, and language centres, although
